A Foster Family's Success at its Finest



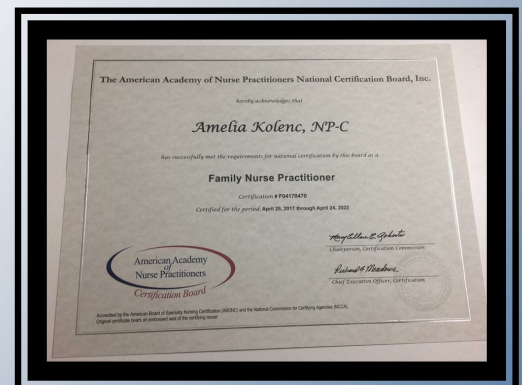

- At Least 38% of foster youth in California Experience 5 or more placements while in foster care.
- Foster youth who experience more placements are nearly 15% less likely to complete high school when compared to their peers.
- 24% of foster youth struggle with disabilities while in school.

Foster Care Facts

- Each year in California, over 4000 young adults exit the foster care system when they turn 21. These "emancipated foster youth" commonly leave the system without a place to live, a job, a high school diploma.
- Children First Foster Family Agency values, supports and promotes education.
- Our THP-Plus Social workers teach youth skills in budgeting, job attainment & resume building, career search and training, bill paying, cooking, cleaning, problem solving, healthy relationships and more!
- Our youth attend quarterly outings to colleges and businesses, have assistance in finding mentors, support with weekly home visits, and

weekly in-home support.

- The agency has created First Cleaning Service to extend employment opportunities for young adults while training and preparing them for successful lives and careers.

For me, a foster child, it was tough being told by my acquaintances and bullies, that I was fat, ugly, annoying and stupid. This may have brought me down quite a ways, but without the support from Children First Foster Family Agency, my teachers, Sequoia school staff, and especially Granny Kay (Foster Parent Kaye Escobedo), I would not have made it.

Like William Durant spoke; "Forget past mistakes. Forget failures. Forget everything except what you're going to do now, and do it."

On my first day of 8th grade, I was extremely scared, but I was welcomed with open arms. It was all a bit much, feeling like a worthless child, and while among some, having a bad reputation. Even with my three to four suspensions and several referrals, I was still welcomed with open arms.

The second thing that I learned is, "You see, even with struggles or a hard life, if you try hard enough, you will succeed!"
