A Word from the SYF Program Founder

In April of this year, during a meeting with local politicians, I learned something that disturbed me very deeply. It was reported that, in Shasta County alone, there are 300-400 children in our high schools who are identified as homeless. The City of Redding is struggling to come up with solutions for the growing homeless population as camps appear on public and private lands, and as business owners complain of vagrancy and criminality problems. This, for me, was the image of homelessness until that evening last April. I had never considered the fact that students enrolled and attending classes at our local High Schools would be homeless.

It could be that these children are living under bridges or in a tent. But for the most part they are couch-surfing from home to home or offered a place to crash at night by the parents of a friend who knows they have nowhere to go. These also are the kids who live with a parent or guardian in

one of the month-by-month motels in town. Any student who lacks a permanent and safe place to live is rightfully identified as homeless because they lack the care, supervision and resources they need to fully participate and succeed academically and socially through High School. Our research discovered that 35% of the adults who are homeless now, experienced homelessness as a child or teenager.

In May, I presented this information along with a plan to assist these students to the Board of Directors who guide Children First as a non-profit organization. The Board approved the plan and allocated the initial funding to create a program that now is in 9 high schools in the north state. With the active participation of High School counselors, principals and staff, we are now able every day to help a student who needs clothes, coats, gloves, and basic life provisions.

The generosity I've found in local and regional businesses has amazed me. This includes the enthusiastic partnership we have found with 9 Starbucks regional managers who are helping us get the word out and advance the fundraising campaign in the various communities we are seeking to serve. These businesses seem to quickly understand what we have the possibility to do on the preventative side of homelessness as we help as many students as we can to complete high school and move forward into a successful adult life.
